The <u>UTK Africana Studies Program</u> executive committee in no uncertain terms condemns the violence of white supremacists that occurred in <u>Charlottesville</u>, <u>Virginia</u> on August 11th and 12th, 2017 at the University of Virginia and led to the death of 3 people. We also condemn efforts by white nationalists, Nazis, and white supremacists to intimidate and terrorize people on college campuses.
